2021 GIVING AND 2022 CONSECRATION SUNDAY [John Baily]

The finance committee reviewed a draft of the 2022 MUMC budget at its December meeting. It has been reported that church attendance and giving are down significantly in 2021 compared to pre COVID years. MUMC giving is down by roughly \$100,000 in 2021 compared to 2019. As previously reported, our financial position has been significantly helped by the monies we received under the CARES Act. As I write this there are two weeks left for giving in 2021. There is still time for you to give in 2021.

Our budget for 2022 will be under significant pressure. We have all read of significant increases in the cost of heating oil and electricity in the New Year. It was reported this week that inflation in the USA is running at a rate of almost 8% in the month of November. Like all of us, MUMC is facing those increased costs as well. In order to get a better picture of our finances in 2022 we are now planning to have Consecration Sunday on January 23. You will hear more about Consecration Sunday in the weeks before January 23. We ask you to pray about what the Lord would have you give. After we have a better estimate of our expected giving, the Finance committee will look to finalize the budget based on our available resources.


A few months ago a committee member could not reach an elderly person and became concerned. Eventually she did but spoke about possible problems in the future.



MUMC TRUSTEES NEWS

- Sexton Bill Rebillard has been busy doing special projects, such as re-staining the legs of the Sanctuary chairs, along with his weekly cleaning of the main church proper mornings, setups for weekly meetings and activities, and afternoon cleaning of the Churchery School.
- The main church parking lots have their winter plowing stakes in place, and Memorial Garden leadership is using barrels and stakes in the Garden area to prevent damage to the plantings and shrubbery there.
- Trustees' 2022 Trustee Budget Proposal reflects a decrease in capital improvements to accommodate an expected increase in natural gas and electric prices, based on projections by the companies that service the Church.
- The Memorials and Special Gifts subcommittee has allocated funds for new technology to be used to facilitate committee communications going forward.
- Klaus Larsen Roofing was chosen to complete the Education Wing roof replacement, along with two additional sections in the back of the church, slated to have begun on December 28th during Churchery School Christmas vacation, weather permitting. As you read this, the work may have already been completed.
- Brotherhood Insurance will require that our new church roofing be inspected by a licensed contractor and a report forwarded to them. In addition, they require that all our other roofs be inspected and certified as sound.
- Because of recent evidence of nighttime visitors parking behind our church building, Trustees have asked for and received extra patrols behind the church by the third shift of the Avon Police Department.
- The lower entry doors of the church have been found unlocked many mornings in the past month upon our sexton's 7:30 AM arrival. It appears that when more than one group is on the property, each expects the other to do the lockup and it isn't getting done all the time. AA, Girls Scouts, etc. have been asked to secure the lower doors regardless of any meeting still in progress upstairs, and all church committees should walk the entire building before leaving to ensure that outside doors' panic bars are in the locked position.

COLD STRESS [Brian Baldwin]



Anyone who is exposed to extreme cold or work in cold environments may be at risk of cold stress. Extremely cold or wet weather is a dangerous situation that can cause illness and injuries such as hypothermia, frostbite, trench foot, and chilblains.

Hypothermia: A condition in which the body uses up its stored energy and can no longer produce heat. Often occurs after prolonged exposure to cold temperature.

Early symptoms: Shivering, Fatigue, Loss of coordination, Confusion and disorientation

Late symptoms: No shivering, Blue skin, Dilated pupils, Slowed pulse and breathing, Loss of consciousness

First Aid: Request immediate medical assistance, Move the victim into a warm room or shelter, Remove wet clothing, Warm the center of their body first-chest, neck, head, and groin. Use dry layers of blankets, clothing, or towels. If conscious, warm beverages may help increase the body temperature. Do not give alcohol. Keep them dry and wrapped in a warm blanket, including the head and neck.

Frostbite: An injury to the body that is caused by freezing, which most often affects the nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers, or toes. Symptoms: Reduced blood flow to hands and feet, Numbness, Aching, Tingling or stinging, Bluish or pale, waxy skin. First Aid: Get into a warm room as soon as possible. Unless necessary, do not walk on frostbitten feet or toes. Do not massage the frostbitten area; doing so may cause more damage. Seek medical care.

Protect Yourself: Monitor your physical condition and that of your family, coworkers and other people around you. Wear appropriate clothing. Wear several layers of loose clothing for insulation. Tight clothing reduces blood circulation to the extremities. Be aware that some clothing may restrict movement resulting in a hazardous situation. Protect the ears, face, hands and feet in extremely cold or wet weather. Boots should be waterproof and insulated. Wear a hat to reduce the loss of body heat from your head. Move into warm locations during breaks; limit the amount of time outside. Carry extra socks, gloves, hats, jacket, blankets, a change of clothes and a thermos of hot liquid. Avoid touching cold metal surfaces with bare skin.



We will begin 2022 with a discussion of *Life* and *Death in Shanghai* by Nien Cheng. "In August 1966 a group of Red Guards ransacked the home of Nien Cheng. Her background made her an obvious target for the fanatics of the Cultural Revolution: educated in London,

the widow of an official of Chiang Kai-Shek's regime, and an employee of Shell Oil, Nien Cheng enjoyed comforts that few of her compatriots could afford. When she refused to confess that any of this made her an enemy of the state, she was placed in solitary confinement, where she would remain for more than six years. Life and Death in Shanghai is the powerful story of Nien Cheng's imprisonment, of the deprivation she endured, of her heroic resistance, and of her quest for justice when she was released. It is the story, too, of a country torn apart by the savage fight for power Mao Tse-tung launched in his campaign to topple party moderates. An incisive, rare personal account of a terrifying chapter in twentieth-century history, Life and Death in Shanghai is also an astounding portrait of one woman's courage." AA / A Longstanding Outreach Program of MUMC



Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) was founded in America in 1935 by Bill Wilson (Bill W.) and Robert Smith (Dr. Bob). Two centuries earlier, John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, established Methodist penitent bands in England, which organized on Saturday nights, the evening on which members of these small groups were most tempted to frequent alehouses. The hymns and teaching provided during these meetings addressed the issues the members faced, thus the connection between these bands and the current practices of AA.

Memorial United Methodist Church has always supported AA, and currently two groups meet weekly in our Fellowship Hall, Wednesday and Saturday nights at 8:00 PM. In addition, other Avon locations for AA meetings are available, one at the Avon Center Congregational Church each morning at 7:00 AM, and also Tuesday evenings at 8:00 PM at the West Avon Congregational Church on Country Club Road. If you know of anyone who would benefit from participating in any of these meetings, please have them contact any of the three churches mentioned. AA is truly a lifesaving program that has stood the test of time.

BEREAVEMENT SUPPORT GROUP VISION, PURPOSE

Everyone grieves differently and in their own way, and your grief will vary from day to day. There is no simple answer nor definitive process for your grief, but know you are not alone. This is the fundamental



benefit of MUMC's Bereavement Support Group, knowing you are not alone and to remember Christ is always with us.

This Support Group provides a safe place to share each other's experiences, concerns and emotions that may be causing pain. Talking with the group about one's experiences with grief and listening to what others have experienced affords a great benefit to understand and process our personal grief.

Your time with the Bereavement Support Group is a time specifically set aside for you to process your grief, away from distractions and the day-to-day frustrations and interruptions we all experience. Here you may cry, remain silent, and express your emotions without fear of judgement, as the members of this group understand what you are going through.

At the end of each session, Pastor Joseph will lead us in prayer, to remind us Christ is always with us, and His grace supports us.

The Bereavement Support Group meets the third Wednesday of every month from 9:30am to 11:00am in the parlor and also on Zoom, Pastor Joseph provides the ZOOM meeting ID several days prior to the meeting. Masks are required for those not vaccinated, but not mandatory for those persons vaccinated.

Please follow these instructions if you wish to have cremains interred in the Memorial United Methodist Church (MUMC) Memorial Garden.

 Contact the Memorial Garden chairperson to begin the process. Call the church office to get the chairperson's phone number. The MUMC office phone is: 860-673-2111.

The remembrance donation of \$500 provides for the bronge nameplate as well as the perpetual care of the Memorial Garden.

- 2. The chairperson will:
 - a) explain the interment process;
 - b) provide the Memorial Garden Remembrance form;
 - c) coordinate and schedule the interment and service with the pastor and the family;
 - d) order and facilitate delivery of a bronze nameplate.
- 3. A completed Memorial Garden Remembrance form is required for all interments.
- Please request at the crematory that the cremains be pulverized to a fine consistency.
 This process is common and produces cremains which are easier to inter or spread on top of the ground.
- 5. The Pastor of MUMC or clergy member of your choice may say some prayers and/or speak briefly. Then the cremains will be respectfully interred by the family and/or friends and/or Memorial Garden chairperson. Some people keep a small amount of the cremains to place in a small urn as a keepsake. It is also an option to spread the cremains on top of the ground in the garden area rather than inter them in the ground.
- 6. No indication or marker will be placed at the site of the cremains to identify where the cremains are located. A bronze nameplate (to be mounted on a plaque in the garden) with an asterisk after the name signifies that cremains are located somewhere in the garden.
- Cremains alone, without any type of container, may be interred in our Memorial Garden. Cremains cannot be interred in our garden if they are placed in any type of container before being placed in the ground.

Empathy is choosing to see ourselves in another despite our differences.

It's recognizing that the same humanity - the same desire for meaning, fulfillment, and security - exists in each of us, even if it's expressed uniquely. - Vivek Murthy

Empathy is a word that is used often by many people. It's commonly known that empathy is a good thing to have, but it isn't always a priority in people's lives.

Did you know that 98% of people have the ability to empathize with others?

While a large majority of the population is capable of empathy, sometimes its practice is limited.

- What is empathy, and why is it important?
- Can empathy be developed, or are we born with a certain amount?
- Are some people just naturally better at empathizing?
- Is it as important as some people say to practice empathy?

In simple terms, empathy is the ability to understand things from another person's perspective. It's the ability to share someone else's feelings and emotions and understand why they have those feelings. Empathy is essential in almost every aspect of daily life. It allows us to have compassion for others, to relate to friends, loved ones, co-workers, and strangers, and it has a significant beneficial impact on the world.

Healthy relationships require nurture, care, and understanding. Any relationship that lacks empathy and compassion will soon flounder. When people only think of their own interests, the other people in the relationships will suffer.

If one person in a relationship forgoes seeing things from the other's perspective, they will likely have interpersonal issues. No two people are ever going to think exactly alike, and no two people will have the same experiences. Both people in a relationship bring their own ideas, life experiences, and struggles. Without trying to relate to one another's feelings and perspectives, people in relationships will likely feel unloved and uncared for.

Empathy from a world perspective is infinitely important, especially when it leads to compassion. This type of empathy pushes people to dive in and help when there are major disasters. People are willing to help out others that they have never met because they know that they, too, would need help if things were reversed.

Without compassionate empathy, the world would be a much darker and less functional place to live.

While there is some evidence that the ability to empathize is traced to genetic predisposition, it's also true that empathy is a skill that can be increased or decreased.
