"Lent: Our Spiritual Quarantine"

The following is an article I found online. It outlines for us the meaning of Lent and the words that have been traditionally used to describe it.

"The old English origin of the word Lent is lencten, referring generally to the Spring season and its lengthening of days. The Latin origins of the term add even more specificity to these lengthening days. Quadragesima means "forty days." Modern Romance languages retain this forty-day specificity in their naming practices. In Spanish, Lent is Cuaresma; in French, Carême; in Italian, Quaresima.

The Italian Quaresima is especially interesting. In the fourteenth century during the Black Death, an isolation period of quaranta giorni—forty days—was prescribed to all ships and people before entering the Venetian city of Dubrovnik (now in Croatia). These terms, Quaresima and quaranta giorni are etymologically linked to a word we never would have guessed to become so colloquial: quarantine."

This article led me to think about the relationship between quarantine and Lent. For reasons of medical necessity, we quarantine ourselves. We separate ourselves from others for two reasons... So that we don't contaminate others and they don't contaminate us with disease. We are disease carriers. But what do we do if the disease is of a spiritual nature called sin. Lent then, can be necessary for the spiritual and emotional health and well being of ourselves and others.

Lent, our spiritual quarantine, is a means for us to separate ourselves from the world, so we aren't contaminated by its lure to sin. And as a way of protecting others, we may consider separating ourselves from them, so we don't perpetuate it by our weakness to sin. TV, social media, the News, all plant seeds of discontent. We become angry, frustrated, depressed, anxious and fearful, and those attitudes contaminate the lives of others, our spouses, our children, and our friends.

Lent, our spiritual quarantine from the world may leave us feeling like we are in a deserted place, but nevertheless a safe place to minimize the world's influence upon us and our proclivity to infect others with the same. Instead, let us turn to God in Christ Jesus, our physician of the soul, and our healer, who alone can fill us with His Spirit, and the peace, love, joy, confidence, and hope that accompanies it. Instead of the news, read the bible. Join a bible study online or here at church. Listen to something uplifting and encouraging. I enjoy contemporary Christian music and find it on FM radio, KLOVE, 106.9. And after our Lent, our Quaresima, our time of healing, let us go forth to share our "New Life" with others. Amen.

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2022 CHURCH BUDGET

A big thank you to all those who got their anticipated giving information to Diane Hornaday, and to Diane, Walt Sargent, John Baily, and all the members of the finance committee for their help in putting together the 2022 church budget. At the February Finance Committee meeting, the church budget was finalized, passed, and subsequently submitted to church council. The church council passed the church budget and the 2022 church budget was adopted by the church at the church charge conference on February 13, 2022.

The 2022 church budget shows a potential deficit of roughly \$43,000. This deficit is caused in part by the elevated inflationary environment which will likely continue for the foreseeable future and the COVID-19 pandemic which limited in-person church attendance and giving. And, while the church cannot run on a deficit for very long, the pastor made an insightful point that this year's budget deficit is also a great opportunity. The church can turn to God in this hour and prayerfully look to innovative ideas to grow the church while also attracting a younger demographic to our loving church family.

Also, Walt Sargent provided to the Finance Committee the January 2022 church financial report. The year-to-date balance shows income roughly \$71,000 higher than expenses. However, it should be kept in mind that much of this balance is due to carry over from last year and also some families providing full year giving in January. Thus, the January year-to-date income to expense balance should not be expected to be indicative of the remainder of 2022.

Finally, on a personal note, I would like to thank outgoing Finance Committee chair John Baily for all his hard work and contributions to the Finance Committee along with all his continued help and guidance in the chair transition process.




A few months ago a committee member could not reach an elderly person and became concerned. Eventually she did but spoke about possible problems in the future.

During MUMC's 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Consecration of our church building in Avon, Records and History Committee showed a video with excerpts from the building and the worship service honoring the 20th anniversary. There was much interest and enjoyment seeing the video which has led us to decide many might enjoy seeing the video of the worship service in its entirety where we can see and hear so many of our members from 30 years ago.

MUMC TRUSTEES NEWS

- Sexton Bill Rebillard has been busy weekday and weekend mornings pretreating, shoveling, and salting sidewalks, along with normal cleaning of the Church and Churchery School. He also replaced kitchen plumbing in Thornburg, installed a new phone in the main kitchen, and has taken up worn second floor hallway tiles and replaced them with new ones. He will also paint classrooms in April and the school office in June.
- The winter plowing stakes remain in place in the church parking lots until spring. Because of more frequent ice storms, our plowing service has also begun to pre-treat the lots to reduce slipperiness. This has added considerable cost to our snow/ice removal budget but is necessary for the safety of church members and visitors.
- Trustees' 2022 Trustee Budget, as expected, reflects a 20%+ increase in natural gas and electric prices for both the main church and the parsonage. In addition, we incurred an expense of over \$2600 to replace main control unit on the church furnace.
- Along with an original church pew from our 1926 Unionville church, Barbara Knibbs, a fifth-generation member of the church, has donated a sum of money that will be used to enhance our historical understanding of MUMC over the past 200 years with a permanent display in Thornburg Parlor.
- KlausLarsen Roofing completed the Education Wing roof replacement, along with two additional sections in the back of the church. The certification for these roofs was forwarded to our insurance company as required.
- A local contractor will evaluate the original main church roof system this spring because Brotherhood Insurance requires that our main church roofing be inspected by a licensed contractor and a report forwarded to them. Any necessary repairs of these 17-year-old roofs will have to be made to maintain our insurance with Brotherhood.
- Trustees have asked that extra patrols behind the church by the third shift of the Avon Police Department continue indefinitely as part of their nightly routine.
- We have had much success in the past two months with church entryway security because all church personnel and committee leaders are walking the entire building before leaving to ensure that outside doors' panic bars are in the locked position.

CURRENT COVID POLICIES AT MUMC



As we continue to battle COVID, we want to update some of our COVID policies. We are reimplementing a mask mandate while in church and asking everyone to sign-in as you arrive. We don't need your telephone or email, as long as it is on file in the church directory. Also, if you test positive, please contact Pastor Joseph ASAP to let him know. He will relay to Kevin Sweet what service you attended (but not your name) and Kevin will contact all other attendees to inform them. Hence the need to reinstate the attendance book.

As a reminder, the CDC recommends people who are exposed + not boosted + more than 6 months from their second dose (or more than 2 months since the J&J) should quarantine for 5 days, followed by strict mask use for 5 days. If you are exposed + boosted, you do not need to quarantine, but should wear a mask for 10 days. Either way, best practice would also include a test at day 5 after the exposure. People with COVID-19 should isolate for 5 days and if they are asymptomatic or their symptoms are resolving (without fever for 24 hours), follow that by 5 days of wearing a mask.

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HOME WORKSPACE

- Location: Selecting a location for your Home Workspace is your first step in creating an area that is safe and comfortable for you to work in. Select an area of your home that offers minimal or no distractions.
- **Privacy** Privacy is essential, as you will be working and conducting business. A door that you can close during meetings or calls to avoid interruptions is important.
- **Lighting -** Select a location in which you can avoid or control glare caused by intense lighting. E.G., you can use a blind or a drape to control the glare coming through your office window.
- Power Outlets Consider your work tools such as laptop, printer, and cell phone to ensure your workspace has enough outlets to accommodate your work tools.
- **Cables -** Make sure the extra-long cat-5 cable is out of the way in order to avoid tripping or rolling over it while sitting.
- **Keyboard Placement** Do not place the keyboard at the side of the monitor. This will cause you to turn your neck to the side constantly and may cause a neck or shoulder injury. The best placement of the keyboard is in front of the monitor at a comfortable distance.
- Mouse Using repetitive motions on your laptop's touchpad or a standard mouse can stress muscles in your fingers and wrists in the same way that repetitive typing can cause fatigue or pain. A mouse that is comfortable to grip and smooth to maneuver is recommended. Hand size makes a difference regarding the type of mouse that you find to be comfortable. Keep your mouse close to your keyboard.
- Filing Cabinets Filing cabinets can be dangerous. If more than one drawer is pulled out, the cabinet can tip. Look for a means to secure the filing cabinet to a wall, etc. Anti-tip kits can be found at your local hardware stores.
- "Blink" to avoid Digital Eye Strain When focusing on digital work you blink less. A simple exercise will help you ensure you blink enough. What does blinking do for you? Blinking cleans the ocular surface of debris by flushing fresh tears over the ocular surface and brings nutrients to your eyes, helping keep them clean. Blinking will improve eye comfort. Set aside five one-minute sessions a day throughout the day. Blink 50 full blinks in each minute. Blink 10 times in each direction: Up, down, left, right and straight. Blinks are not a tight lid squeeze, only closures.
- Minimize eye strain Keep your monitor screen clean at all times. Use anti-static cleaning materials and products. Found at most large supercenters, computer stores, or online.
- Move, Stretch, Change It is important to move periodically to avoid muscle fatigue and discomfort. Stretch and Change your position often to avoid discomfort and muscle fatigue. If you begin to feel uncomfortable, stop and rest and stretch your arms, hands, and fingers. Take a mini-break!

Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) was founded in America in 1935 by Bill Wilson (Bill W.) and Robert Smith (Dr. Bob). Two centuries earlier, John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, established Methodist penitent bands in England, which organized on Saturday nights, the evening on which members of



these small groups were most tempted to frequent alehouses. The hymns and teaching provided during these meetings addressed the issues the members faced, thus the connection between these bands and the current practices of AA.

Memorial United Methodist Church has always supported AA, and currently two groups meet weekly in our Fellowship Hall, Wednesday and Saturday nights at 8:00 PM. In addition, other Avon locations for AA meetings are available, one at the Avon Center Congregational Church each morning at 7:00 AM, and also Tuesday evenings at 8:00 PM at the West Avon Congregational Church on Country Club Road. Please follow these instructions if you wish to have cremains interred in the Memorial United Methodist Church (MUMC) Memorial Garden.

 Contact the Memorial Garden chairperson to begin the process. Call the church office to get the chairperson's phone number. The MUMC office phone is: 860-673-2111.

The remembrance donation of \$500 provides for the bronge nameplate

as well as the perpetual care of the Memorial Garden.

- 2. The chairperson will:
 - a) explain the interment process;
 - b) provide the Memorial Garden Remembrance form;
 - c) coordinate and schedule the interment and service with the pastor and the family;
 - d) order and facilitate delivery of a bronze nameplate.
- 3. A completed Memorial Garden Remembrance form is required for all interments.
- Please request at the crematory that the cremains be pulverized to a fine consistency.
 This process is common and produces cremains which are easier to inter or spread on top
 of the ground.
- 5. The Pastor of MUMC or clergy member of your choice may say some prayers and/or speak briefly. Then the cremains will be respectfully interred by the family and/or friends and/or Memorial Garden chairperson. Some people keep a small amount of the cremains to place in a small urn as a keepsake. It is also an option to spread the cremains on top of the ground in the garden area rather than inter them in the ground.
- 6. No indication or marker will be placed at the site of the cremains to identify where the cremains are located. A bronze nameplate (to be mounted on a plaque in the garden) with an asterisk after the name signifies that cremains are located somewhere in the garden.
- Cremains alone, without any type of container, may be interred in our Memorial Garden. Cremains cannot be interred in our garden if they are placed in any type of container before being placed in the ground.

STEPHEN MINSTRY

Interested in Becoming A Stephen Minister?

There is a great need for additional Stephen Ministers in the community. Anyone is eligible to become a Stephen Ministry caregiver.

What is Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Ministry is a lay caregiving ministry that supplements pastoral care. The program teaches laypeople to provide one-on-one care for individuals who request support. Well over one-and-a-half million people around the world have benefited from the Christ-centered care of a Stephen Minister. There are currently more than 600,000 laypeople serving in this ministry.

Started in 1975 by a clergy person needing assistance with pastoral care, Stephen Ministry is now in more than 13,000 congregations from more than 180 Christian denominations, in all 50 states in the U.S., 10 Canadian provinces, and 30 other countries. Both Simsbury UMC and Avon Memorial UMC have active teams of Stephen Ministers.

Reverend Mel Kawakami, M.Div, Th.M, former SUMC pastor and AMUMC Interim Pastor, brought Stephen Ministry to both churches. We asked Reverend Mel to share his perspective of the program's role:

Why did you decide to begin a Stephen Ministry program?

Serving SUM as the Associate Pastor for Parish Care and Visitation in 1997 in what was then a 1,000-member church, it became apparent that I would not be able to adequately cover parish care by myself. However, it was equally apparent that I was surrounded by capable and willing laypeople, inspired by the Holy Spirit and ready to serve the people of God.

In 2001, a number of us attended a Stephen Ministry introduction event in West Hartford. Out of that, two laypeople and I attended Leader Training in 2002. We began training the first class of 10 SUMC Stephen Ministers in September of 2003, and they were commissioned in February 2004.

I also served as Interim Pastor at Avon MUMC in 1994-1995 and so was intimately involved in their pastoral needs. It seemed natural that SUM would ally with a sister UMC and join in training and supervision. The next training included members of the Avon congregation, who were commissioned in February 2005.

What type of person is best suited to become a Stephen Minister?

I have been surprised by the Spirit. I do admit coming into this ministry that I carried some presuppositions: that it would take a caring, listening, particularly dedicated person who would be called. Then Jesus reminded me of who He called as the first disciples: ordinary folk dealing with a life of following Jesus. So there have been people of all walks of life, all temperaments, and any number of levels of commitment who feel called. Part of the resulting richness of the experience and supervision is the result of this variety.

It is a powerful witness that laypeople are willing to hear the call to ministry, be rigorously trained for that call, and be regularly supervised in their caregiving. As pastor, it was especially important to me that the ongoing bond between the caregiver and care receiver was supervised and confidentiality was maintained. I could trust that people whom I referred to caregivers were treated with the deepest faithfulness and respect.

What are the blessings of being a SM?

I truly believe there is no deeper honor than to walk with someone in their faith journey. We may travel the deepest valleys with them, and share the highest peaks, but doing so is a sacred privilege. At all times, we are not alone, but can sense the presence of Jesus (and the running SM joke is, Jesus walks with one hand on my shoulder and one hand over my mouth!). Thinking of the few times pastors may have this privilege (counseling, baptisms, weddings, sick beds, funerals), being able to share these moments with laypeople in Stephen Ministry is a true gift.

What types of issues do caregivers help with?

Care receivers may need support in dealing with any number of issues: divorce, loss of employment, grief, health problems, loneliness, dependency issues, aging parents, depression or anxiety, low self-esteem, financial problems, parenting, feelings of guilt, infidelity, or relationships with family, friends, or coworkers. Caregivers also help those seeking a relationship with God or suffering from a loss of faith.

In general, what is the process like?

Stephen Ministry training typically consists of about 20 two-and-one-half-hour weekly interactive classroom sessions, and is provided at no cost. A Referrals Coordinator assigns care receivers to each caregiver. Caregivers typically meet with their care receivers for one hour each week. Supervision with the entire group of Stephen Ministers is provided twice a month and continuing education once a month.

Stephen Ministers provide caregiving to others through the power of Christ's love. If you enjoy caring for others, God might call you to serve as a Stephen Minister.
