A month has passed since Hyeonjin and I moved in Avon! I am so thankful for God's guidance and your warm welcome. I am still the new pastor at our church, and it will take time to get to know each other. First, I would like you to know that I am available to meet with you in my office or at your place. I often emphasize that the pastor should be available to the congregation. Our God came to this world to live with us, and I would like to imitate what our God Jesus Christ did in this world.

I have served as pastor in a cross-racial and cross-cultural setting: I am an Asian American, and the congregation that I have served is composed of White Americans, African Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, and so on. Therefore, it is nothing new for me. Yet, I realize that I am the first non-European descendent pastor at our church who speaks English as a second language.

So, this could be pretty new to many of you, and it may be natural for some of you to ask, "Anything good come out of Korea?" Yes, some things good can come out of Korea! BTS (방탄소년단 in Korean), the famous K-pop group who visited the White House a couple of months ago and gave a speech about "Stop Asian Hate." They are from Korea. If I invite them into our church, will they come? I don't think so. Yet, I can translate the Korean lyrics of their songs into English even if they may have already been translated.

The movie, "Parasite," which won the academy award for best picture two years ago. It was made in Korea. And the blockbuster Netflix drama, "Squid Game." It also came from Korea. How about Pastor Sungmu? He is from Korea, too.

If anyone asks, "Can Anything good come out of Korea?" you may answer "Come and see!" I am confident that you and I will do ministry effectively in love and harmony and together make a difference at our church, our society, and our world. You and I have different cultural backgrounds but something great in common. That is, we have Jesus Christ as our Savior. In addition, we have one another who are willing to dedicate ourselves to God, God's church, and God's people. What else do we need?

Let us do ministry together with great joy. We have Jesus and one another. Enjoy the rest of summer and be well!

FEEDBACK ON WORSHIP

Thank you to those of you who took time to talk to members of the committee, email me and/or Pastor Lee, or attend the Liturgical Arts meeting with feedback on our recent services. You have been heard. The committee met and reviewed both the praises and concerns we have heard.

While change is inevitable with a new music director and pastor, we realize that the abrupt shift to contemporary music was a shock to many of you. Our end goal is a blended service that follows the Methodist Book of Worship and incorporates some contemporary music.

When Elizabeth was hired, she was told that our church wanted to bring more contemporary music to our services. Given the timing of her starting, she did not have a lot of guidance her first few weeks, so we got to experience a different form of worship that is powerful to some and was the focus of her previous employment. As Pastor, Rev. Lee has joined us, he has been able to provide her more guidance on Methodist traditions, and together we will continue to work toward a worship that is meaningful to all. Our focus is on God and praising him with our hearts, minds, and voices.

Some of the prioritized changes were implemented on Sunday the 17th and more adjustments were made on the 24th. Please be patient as we all work together to make MUMC worship something powerful for all!

Please see below a summary of feedback and items that the committee is discussing. If you would like to provide further thoughts or reflections, contact me or Pastor Lee (sungmulee@icloud.com)

• Pastor Lee will process to the altar with the "worship leader" after the prelude and open worship with a greeting.

• Music will include traditional hymns and contemporary praise songs.

Praise song time will be shortened

• When hymns are used, they will be listed in the bulletin with page numbers.

No mic for known hymns

 Closing benediction song will be sung before the postlude. (We go now in peace...)

• We will remove the offering plate at the front of the sanctuary, and reposition the one in the back.

• We will do a version of a hymn sing in August. Favorite hymns will be collected in a basket in the back of the sanctuary starting the first Sunday in August.

• Requests for praise song music so those who read music can better follow along.

- Bulletin wording and formatting
- · Sound system limitations and purchasing new elements
- Historical background of hymns displayed

We will meet again in August to discuss startup of choirs.

Again, thank you all for your understanding, patience, and prayer during this time of transition. We have a strong congregation and I know we can get through this and be better for it.

FINANCE

The church's general fund is very close to being in a deficit position, where the general fund expenses are higher than the general fund income. This means the initial positive position the budget was in earlier in the year due to larger contributions in January has now rolled off.

Thus, over the coming handful of months, we are asking committees to closely watch their spending on items from the budget in the general account. If items can be delayed or aren't absolutely necessary, we are asking committees to postpone those items for now.

Note, this does not impact funding for items that have designated funds outside the general fund, for example this wouldn't necessarily impact the revitalization project which have its own dedicated fund.

The finance committee is also planning to delay discretionary spending (such as apportionments) a couple months to see if the financial position of the year-to-date budget improves with additional giving when folks return from summer school breaks and vacations.

Please prayerfully consider the financial position of the general fund in your giving over the near term.




RALLY DAY!!! SEPTEMBERFEST!!! OPEN HOUSE!!!

HEAT - PET SAFETY [Brian Baldwin]



LIMIT EXERCISE ON HOT DAYS

Limit your pet's walks and outdoor time on hot and humid days. Adjust the intensity and duration of their exercise dependent on the temperature. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours. Pets with white fur can be more susceptible to sun damage and short-nosed pets (pugs, bulldogs, boxers) can experience breathing difficulty. And remember, asphalt gets very hot and can damage our pet's paws so choose a grassy or dirt path, if possible.

PROVIDE AMPLE SHADE AND WATER

Any time your pet is outside, make sure he or she has access to shade to protect them from the sun. Have accessible plenty of fresh, cold water to prevent dehydration. In heat waves, add ice to water when possible.

DOGGIE POOLS, SPRINKLERS, COOLING VESTS, AND MORE...

It's amazing the products you can purchase for your pet! If your dog enjoys baths and swims, try investing in a kiddie (err, doggie) pool, dog sprinkler, or even a cooling vest. The possibilities are endless!

WATCH FOR SIGNS OF HEATSTROKE

Extreme temperatures can cause heatstroke. Some signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and unconsciousness. Animals are at particular risk for heatstroke if they are very old, very young, overweight, not conditioned to prolonged exercise, or have heart or respiratory disease.

If you suspect your pet is suffering from heatstroke, move them immediately into the shade or an air-conditioned area. Apply ice packs or cold towels to her head, neck, and chest or run cool (not cold) water over them and seek veterinary care immediately.

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MUMC TRUSTEES NEWS

- Sexton Bill Rebillard continues working on the parsonage mowing and trimming. He also painted the hallway ceiling, the den, and did a full house cleaning before the new pastor arrived. Linda Kime also worked on parsonage preparation, deep cleaning all the carpets on the main floor. Bill also waxed the entire sanctuary, completed painting in the education wing area, and shampooed the Fellowship Hall carpet. He also mulched the lower gardens, improved the drainage in the playground, and repainted all the handicapped and fire zone areas.
- Kevin from Morin Paving surveyed the 11 deep cracks and holes that have accumulated over the past several years in our parking lots, and we have contracted with Morin for a price of \$1900 to repair all within the next two months.
- The A/C units in the lower south classrooms of the Education Wing are in place now and can be used for Vacation Bible Camp in August.
- Bob Marshall's Records and History Committee continues planning to use fifth-generation church member Barbara Knibbs' donation of a 1926 church pew and sum of money to enhance our historical understanding of MUMC over the past 200 years. Ideas for a rotating display of artifacts alongside a video presentation on the west wall of Thornburg Parlor were discussed. David Gorden has graciously agreed to provide a design idea for this wall display.
- Marsha continues to receive Building Use Request forms even during the summer months. For one-time events, please reserve space at least one month in advance so Virginia can add it to the monthly on-line calendar for easy reference. All committees should submit their full year 2022-2023 monthly meeting schedule to Marsha and Virginia by the end of August so a yearly calendar can be planned.
- Our new AED is on order and delayed until at least August.
- Chairman Jeff Tremback's Memorial Garden members continue to maintain the appearance of this beautiful area. Noel Rendell led a crew recently to add mulch that Hal Johansen delivered from Dunning. Due to the high heat, Service of Remembrance was held in the sanctuary on Jul 24th, officiated by Rev. Lee.
- Churchery School will still require separate entrance and exit for student and parent arrival and departure in the fall of 2022 as BA.5 Omicron variants spread. Other protocols will be enacted as needed when outbreaks arise.

- Thomas Baily and Nate Ross have taken the lead in refurbishing and upgrading the basketball court on the west parking lot of the church as their confirmation project.
- The Girl Scouts finished work on the Fellowship Hall Courtyard and have repainted the benches, which get quite a lot of use from church members and our Wednesday and Saturday AA groups. They did a beautiful job painting and etching sayings on each bench.
- Cerruto Flooring once again will strip and wax the entire downstairs area, including the lower floor hallway, foyer, and kitchen, in late August. Since Bill will take care of the Fellowship Hall carpet shampooing, we can add in the kitchen this year.
- Johnny met in June at the church with KlausLarsen Roofing's general manager to point out the need to improve the flashing design on the new roof on the north side of the church. Klaus returned in mid-July to replace the lead flashing with copper counterflashing to tighten up that side, which gets the worst of the weather in all types of storms. Johnny himself solved the same problem with the office area roofs some years ago.
- **Pastor Lee** requested that we investigate the possibility of replacing our main road church signage with possibly two signs, one at each entrance. The Town of Avon, however, allows only one detached sign per business, sited well off the roadway, which we already have in place.
- Our office copier budget is overextended because of heavy printing use in the April-June time period, running \$300 over budget this past quarter. Unfortunately, limitations on copier use, especially color, must be put into place, to reduce this budget area.

Memorial United Methodist Church has always supported AA, and currently two groups meet weekly in our Fellowship Hall, Wednesday and Saturday nights at 8:00pm. In addition, other Avon locations for AA meetings are available, one at the Avon Center Congregational Church each morning at 7:00am, and also Tuesday evenings at 8:00pm at the West Avon Congregational Church on Country Club Road. AA is truly a lifesaving program that has stood the test of time.



Bronze Nameplate Information: Use additional forms for multiple requests. Please print information in CAPITAL LETTERS, maximum 20, including spaces.

The remembrance donation of \$500 provides for the bronge nameplati as well as the perpetual care of the Memorial Garden.

Please follow these instructions if you wish to have cremains interred in the Memorial United Methodist Church (MUMC) Memorial Garden.

- 1. Contact the Memorial Garden chairperson to begin the process. Call the church office to get the chairperson's phone number. The MUMC office phone is: 860-673-2111.
- 2. The chairperson will:
 - a) explain the interment process;
 - b) provide the Memorial Garden Remembrance form;
 - c) coordinate and schedule the interment and service with the pastor and the family; d) order and facilitate delivery of a bronze nameplate.
- 3. A completed Memorial Garden Remembrance form is required for all interments.
- 4. Please request at the crematory that the cremains be pulverized to a fine consistency. This process is common and produces cremains which are easier to inter or spread on top of the ground.
- 5. The Pastor of MUMC or clergy member of your choice may say some prayers and/or speak briefly. Then the cremains will be respectfully interred by the family and/or friends and/or Memorial Garden chairperson. Some people keep a small amount of the cremains to place in a small urn as a keepsake. It is also an option to spread the cremains on top of the ground in the garden area rather than inter them in the ground.
- 6. No indication or marker will be placed at the site of the cremains to identify where the cremains are located. A bronze nameplate (to be mounted on a plaque in the garden) with an asterisk after the name signifies that cremains are located somewhere in the garden.
- 7. Cremains alone, without any type of container, may be interred in our Memorial Garden. Cremains cannot be interred in our garden if they are placed in any type of container before being placed in the ground.

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We Say Goodbye to Gail Colon Anne Fitzgerald Records & History

On July 10th we wished Gail Colon goodbye and good wishes as she relocated from Farmington Woods to what has been her snowbird home on Florida's west coast in



North Fort Myers. Gail has a long history with us, and I wanted to share it with you all. This article is taken from her oral history interview on July 6, 2011. We ran the original article in October 2021 for the 50th anniversary of the consecration of our sanctuary and I thought it was appropriate to run an edited version of it again on the occasion of her leaving us.

Anne Fitzgerald, Records & History

She was born Gail Esther Eaton on November 9, 1938 in Bristol, CT and is now 83. After high school she attended Bryant College in Providence then worked at Pratt & Whitney until she married Don Colon in 1960 and they moved to Avon. Having been brought up Methodist, she attended the old stone church on School Street



in Unionville with Rev. Dick Yerrington. She officially joined on May 21, 1961, transferring from Prospect Methodist in Bristol. That's 61 years ago!

While the congregation was still in the old stone church in Unionville, Gail taught Sunday school and remembers having to teach in Union School because the church had run out of room. Ultimately the parsonage immediately next door was torn down and the parish hall was built. The Town of Farmington now uses the parish hall for alternative high school. Gail was also on the committee to find a new parsonage; we ended up purchasing a home on West District Road in Unionville but sold that in the 1980s and purchased the current one on Kingsbridge in Avon.

A special memory is the Mother Daughter Wedding Fashion Show at which two of her daughters got to see her in her wedding dress.

All three of Gail's daughters are on Florida's east coast, but she gets to see them often. When in Connecticut her oldest daughter Jill lives in a little cottage at the Plainville Campground with her three precious little grand dogs! In Florida she rents a condo in Schooner Bay in North Fort Myers, a great place with a pool, party rooms and a barbecue area. It's located on the Caloosahatchee River where they can see dolphins and an occasional manatee.

She attends Grace United Methodist Church in Cape Coral. It's a huge church with four services and three ministers. The band is on the altar and the music jolts the congregation when it starts playing. The 10:30 service has about 500-600 attendees.

Gail says her greatest claim to fame in Connecticut is introducing her high school friend Penny White to Rev. Dick Continued

Yerrington. Penny's comment was "What, me date a minister?!"
