I often feel that we live in a society in which science has become idolatrous. Most people in modern society influenced by science tend to regard a scientific fact as the most import ant and authentic source. On the other hand, the word *mystery* seems not to provide us with a positive feeling because we use it when we cannot explain something scientifically.

However, Christianity itself is full of mystery: the incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. How can we explain these Christian features with human words? Modern Christians need to break down the idol of science and be able to understand mystery as mystery, not based on science.

Some modern people may ask us, "Why do you go to church on Sunday? If you have that kind of time, take a rest and prepare for the coming week, or enjoy yourself." This sounds reasonable. Yet, they do not know that there is something going on at Christian worship, something mysterious.

We experience God, feeling God's presence vividly and receiving the message more than we can imagine. Insight is given to us, inspiration that we did not even know we wanted. It may not seem scientific, but that is the way it is whenever we worship the triune God.

Holy Communion

As you receive Holy Communion, you taste the spiritual body and blood of Christ through the Holy Spirit. As you participate in the Baptismal rite, you have an opportunity to remember your baptism and be thankful. As a pastor prays for you, laying on of hands, you will experience the healing power of the Lord who will heal you of all illnesses—of body, mind, spirit, and relationships.

If you like your reality fixed and scientific, then such a setting can be meaningless to you. But if you are willing to embrace the possibility that there is meaning beyond mystery, then this setting of worship can be a fun place to experience God. Lent is deep now. Let us come together, worship together, and experience God together! Amen.

A new event at MUMC. Fun time for all ages! 9-10:30 am – Breakfast & Crafts; photo op with the Easter Bunny



Registration materials for the 2025-2026 school year will be sent to all of our families this month. We have a few openings in our 4's program.





ST. PATRICK AND CORNED BEEF

Saint Patrick, known as the "Apostle of Ireland", was active as a missionary in Ireland during the fifth century. According to Patrick's autobiographical *Confessio*, when he was about sixteen, he was captured by Irish pirates from his home in Britain and taken as a slave to Ireland, where he worked as an animal herder.

He writes that after six years of captivity he heard a voice telling him that he would soon go home, and that his ship was ready. Fleeing his master, he travelled to a port two hundred miles away, where he found a ship and with difficulty persuaded the captain to take him. According to his *Declaration*, after three days' sailing, they landed in Britain. Everyone left the ship and walked for 28 days in a "wilderness" and become faint from hunger.

After Patrick prayed for sustenance, they encountered a herd of wild boar. Since this was shortly after Patrick had urged them to put their faith in God, his prestige in the group was greatly increased. He returned home. studied Christianity, become a cleric and returned to spread Christianity in northern and western Ireland. Saint Patrick's Day, considered his feast day, is observed on 17 March, the supposed date of his death. He is credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland, converting a pagan society in the process.





I think his Wikipedia page needs to be updated, because he can now be credited with bringing 70 guests to our annual corned beef dinner at Avon MUMC on 3/16. While our feast didn't include wild boar, it did include 60 pounds of corned beef, 30 pounds of potatoes, 7 loaves of Irish soda bread, 20 pounds of carrots, 5 heads of cabbage, 7 youth volunteers, multiple adult volunteers and too many desserts to even estimate. I'm wondering what would have happened if St Patrick's group had encountered tins of mint frosting-covered brownies? I'm not sure why they would have been there, but I'm guessing even more people would have converted on the spot.

We gratefully received \$973 in donations at the dinner. Since all materials and labor were donated, this translates into \$973 of food that gets put into the food pantry and shared

throughout the larger community.

Our little food pantry distributes up to \$300 per week to people who, like St Patrick, may otherwise go hungry. It is a wonderful mission made possible by the generosity of our volunteers and supporters. Even though St Patrick may get the credit, our many thanks to everyone who participated and contributed.



Congrats to Sue Yankus on becoming a first time Gramma.with the arrival of Brooks William Yankus on March 25 to her son Will and his wife, Lauren.






BOY SCOUTS "PRAY" PROGRAM
