"Before and after!" This sounds like a TV commercial that describes the great difference between before and after using its product. Every day, we encounter these kinds of commercials that emphasize "before and after." As we celebrate Pentecost Sunday on June 8th, I would like to mention the Bible story of "before and after."

Before Pentecost, the disciples were dense, timid bumblers who locked themselves in the upper room. But afterwards, they became fearless religious leaders. They healed the sick and cast out demons. Before experiencing the Holy Spirit on Pentecost, Peter had denied Jesus three times and ran away from him. But afterwards, he fearlessly witnessed about Jesus Christ and died a martyr.

How could Peter change his personality? The Holy Spirit enabled him to willingly suffer with Jesus so that he could be glorified with Jesus. When Peter lived with the Holy Spirit, he was moved to fulfill his Christian faith.

There are also big differences in our lives between before and after experiencing the Holy



Spirit. Before receiving the Holy Spirit, we were not very kind to others. But afterwards, we include and accept others as friends. We did not have joy in our lives. But now, we have the joy that God gives us because we have confidence for eternal life.

We criticized each other and hated each other. But afterwards, we forgive each other and love each other. We were not willing to spend our time, energy, and money for our church. But afterwards, we are joyfully dedicating ourselves to the church. This is a miracle of the Holy Spirit. Before and after, there are a lot of changes.

Do you want to change yourself positively? Do you want to live a joyful life that God gives to you? Then, open your hearts and let the Holy Spirit come into you and live with you. After that, you will enjoy the fruit of the Holy Spirit, which is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). Happy Pentecost!

Her grandmother is one of only a handful of female doctors in China, and she teaches Yunxian the of Chinese medicine. pillars the Examinations—looking, listening, touching, and asking-something a man can never do with a female patient.

From a young age, Yunxian learns about women's illnesses...alongside a young midwife-in-training, Meiling. The two girls find fast friendship and a mutual purpose...and they vow to be forever friends, sharing in each other's joys and struggles...But when Yunxian is sent into an arranged marriage, her mother-in-law forbids her from seeing Meiling and from helping the women and girls in the household. Yunxian is to act like a proper wife—embroider bound-foot slippers, recite poetry, give birth to sons, and stay forever within the walls of the family compound, the Garden of Fragrant Delights.

How might a woman like Yunxian break free of these traditions and lead a life of such importance that many of her remedies are still used five centuries later?...A captivating story of women helping each other, *Lady Tan's Circle of Women* is a triumphant reimagining of the life of one person who was remarkable in the Ming dynasty and would be considered remarkable today." MUMC MEMORIAL GARDEN

May 2025 Update

The Committee has contracted for irrigation and maintenance with Grasshelper. In addition, we have ordered and planted sunpatien annuals and rosebushes, cleaned up the entire Garden area, cut low hanging tree limbs, fertilized roses, and top-dressed mulched areas at our Spring Cleanup and continuing into the following weeks as needed. We also will contact our arborist to prune the three trees in the center circle area, as well as those that line the south driveway from West Avon Road all the way down to the Garden Then from June through September, Gardeners will take responsibility singly or in pairs for the weekly weeding, spraying, deadheading, and other routine maintenance to ensure that the Garden always looks its best.

Planned special activities include individual memorial services for departed members, installing nameplates for the deceased on our Memorial stones, and holding a Service of Remembrance in the Garden in September, in conjunction with a special Sunday service in the Sanctuary that same morning.

UPDATE FROM YOUR FINANCE COMMITTEE



Hello Folks,

As of the end of April, we find ourselves at a critical point in the year, financially speaking. While our giving has exceeded our budget expectations, thanks to your continued generosity, our expenses have also exceeded our

budget expectations. Just as you at home have experienced the pain of rising costs of goods and electricity, so has MUMC. You may recall that our budget this year is not a balanced budget, and as such relies on either receiving or earning additional income and/or looking for cost savings throughout the year. We also have carry-over income from last year to help buffer the storm.

As of the end of April, MUMC's year to date income is \$86,909.65. Our expenses were \$101,462 for a net income of -\$14,552.35. This negative net income has been offset by our carryover amount from last year of approximately \$30,000. I say that this is a critical point because at this rate, our overall budget will become negative and we may need to tap into our reserve funds. We ask our congregation to consider this in your giving going forward. We know that giving to pay electricity, gas bills, lawn maintenance, and salaries may not be as rewarding as giving for missions such as the food pantry, UM Army, fuel banks, or any of our many other mission initiatives, but it is just as essential. Keeping the lights on and the bills paid lets us do more mission work to help others. This congregation has shown their generosity in so many ways. Where this has been a need, it has been met. Please consider contributions to our general fund a need as well.

You know you're a Methodist if.....

We make fun of Methodists for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed, and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese.

But nobody sings like them. If you were to ask an audience in New York City, a relatively Methodist-less place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael Row the Boat Ashore," they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Methodists, they smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach! And down the road!

Many Methodists are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage.

It's natural for Methodists to sing in harmony. They are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By joining in harmony, they somehow promise that they will not forsake each other.

I do believe this: People, these Methodists, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you can call up when you're in deep distress.

- *If you're dying, they will comfort you.
- *If you are lonely, they'll talk to you.
- *And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad.
- *Methodists believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud.

*Methodists like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.
